

Fair Announcements

The 99th Annual Bethlehem Fair will be held on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, September 6, 7, and 8, 2024 at our fairgrounds on Route 61, Bethlehem, CT. Friday hours are 5 pm to 10 pm, Saturday hours are 8 am to 10 pm, and Sunday hours are 8 am to 5:30 pm.

Admission prices are \$10 for adults and \$9 for senior citizens age 65 and over. Admission is free to children under age 12 when accompanied by an adult. Auto parking is free.

The Fair maintains an office at 384 Main Street North, Bethlehem, CT.

Visitors are welcome.

The Bethlehem Fair Society will take all reasonable precautions for the safety of exhibits but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur. It will also not be responsible for any injuries to persons, animals, automobiles, or other property.

If the receipts should not be sufficient to pay the premiums in full, proportionate reductions will be made in all classes.

Anyone wishing to stay overnight to tend their animals must obtain an overnight badge from their department superintendent. All others must leave the fairgrounds at the conclusion of each day's activities or be subject to arrest for trespassing.

Any offensive language or behavior toward Fair officials, superintendents, head judges, committee members, or timekeepers before, during, or after the contest, or actions deemed to not be in the best interest of the Fair will disqualify the contestant and any premiums due will be forfeited. This may also result in disbarment of participation in future events.

During competitive exhibits, any exhibitor found to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs will be immediately disqualified from the event that he or she has entered. The superintendent of each committee will ensure that this regulation is enforced.

GENERAL STATUTES OF CONNECTICUT, SECTION 22-125

NOTE: Interference or harassment by an exhibitor of a State Livestock Inspector while the inspector is carrying out prescribed duties will result in the forfeiture of premium monies and/or expulsion from the fairgrounds.

General Rules

The following rules apply to exhibitors at the Bethlehem Fair. Some departments have exceptions, and these exceptions take precedence over the general rules. We maintain the right to reject any exhibit deemed not appropriate for the Fair.

ENTRY BLANKS: One name per entry blank. All Photography and Realism Art entry blanks must be received at the Bethlehem Fair Office no later than 6 pm Labor Day. All mailed entry blanks must be in the Fair mail box no later than the day after Labor Day. Positively no entry blanks will be accepted after 8 pm Tuesday.

ENTRY FEES: Adult exhibitors age 12 and over must include an entry fee of \$10.00 per exhibitor with their entry blank. This entry fee entitles the exhibitor to admission to the Fair on Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday. Check department rules for exceptions.

ENTRY TAGS: Entry tags should be securely fastened to all exhibits. Please specify on the entry blank if you would like your tags held for pickup at the Bethlehem Fair Office.

EXHIBIT DELIVERY: Exhibits must be delivered to the Bethlehem Fairgrounds Thursday between 6 pm and 9 pm. All exhibits must be in place by 9 pm Thursday. Note that exhibit delivery varies; check department rules for exceptions.

Non-Livestock Exhibitors: All non-livestock exhibits will be required to enter using the South Gate to deliver exhibits to the Main, Junior, and Photography barns.

Livestock Exhibitors: All livestock exhibitors must enter the grounds using the South Gate.

EXHIBIT REMOVAL: All exhibits must remain until 5:30 pm Sunday unless otherwise stated in department rules. Any food, vegetable, fruit, or flower exhibit remaining after 6:30 pm Sunday becomes the property of the Bethlehem Fair and will be distributed to a local soup kitchen. Any ribbons will be mailed.

Non-Livestock Exhibitors:

Exhibit pickup from buildings Sunday shall commence at 5:30 pm, and exhibitors
picking up items must enter grounds using the South Gate to access the areas
behind these buildings; no exhibitor vehicles will be allowed in midway or vendor
areas. Items not picked up by September 30th become the property of the
Bethlehem Fair.

Livestock Exhibitors:

- Cattle, goats, and sheep will be released at 5 pm Sunday. Exhibitors are expected
 to have their trailers behind the cattle and sheep barns, and to exit via Gate #2
 after loading.
- Removal of small animals (poultry, rabbits, cavies, etc.) will not be allowed before
 5:30 pm. Exhibitors may enter South Gate #1 at 5:30 pm and proceed to their barn to pick up animals, then exit via Gate #2 after loading.


Livestock Parking: The South Gate will be closed to livestock traffic from 9 am to 8 pm Saturday and from 9 am to 5:30 pm Sunday.

WHO MAY ENTER: The show is open to all ages.

CONTEST TIME AND PLACE: 3 pm Saturday at the Main Stage

REGISTRATION: Email Donna Poliquin at

donnapoliquin@gmail.com by August 28 to schedule an audition time. Auditions will be held on the weekend of August 31.

The show will be limited to 10 acts which will be chosen through an audition process.

- Talents may include (but not limited to) singing, dancing, instrumental music, skits, magic, comedy, martial arts, and juggling. NO LIP-SYNCHING.
- 2. Recommended length is 3 minutes; acts must be no longer than 5 minutes.
- 3. In all cases, decisions of the judges are final and will not be open to discussion.
- 4. Absolutely no profanity or insensitive subject matter will be permitted.
- 5. Costumes must be appropriate for all age groups. This is a community event.
- 6. If your act requires recorded accompanying music, the music must be submitted at the time of the audition.
- 7. Acts with any member under 18 must have written consent from parents.
- 8. All acts are responsible for paying admission into the Fair.
- 9. Previous first place winners are ineligible to compete.

OVERNIGHT RULES FOR EXHIBITORS IN ALL LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS

1. PASSES/PERMITS:

- Will be issued when exhibitor(s) arrive(s).
- B. Must be signed by Department Superintendent or Assistant.
- C. Must be worn at all times between 6 pm and 5 am, Friday and Saturday.
- D. Will not be mailed, and are **NOT** transferable.
- E. Must be filled out in full Friday evening, no one with a blank pass will be allowed to remain.
- F. Will be issued in appropriate numbers for exhibit. Exhibitor and one (1) helper for individual entries.
- G. Will only be issued to exhibiting club members for "Club" exhibits, and leaders/chaperones 21 or older.

2. OTHER RULES:

- A. All exhibitors and helpers under 18 on Fair dates who will be staying overnight Friday and/or Saturday <u>MUST</u> submit a completed permission form signed by a parent/guardian with entry blank.
- B. Only exhibiting members of a club exhibit will be allowed to stay overnight. Each club must have a parent/leader/chaperone (21 years or older) staying with them regardless of the ages of the exhibitors.
- C. All overnight exhibitors are to be in designated areas from 11 pm to 5 am unless using the bathroom facilities. Those discovered outside the area will be warned about further incidents and escorted back to their department. A second warning will result in a parent/guardian being notified to remove the individual from the fairgrounds for the night.
- D. Any exhibitor, regardless of age, suspected to be under the influence of or dispensing alcohol will be referred to the police. A parent/guardian will be notified to pick up the offender. The individual will not be allowed on the fairgrounds for the remainder of the Fair.
- E. No exhibitors or helpers will be allowed to sleep in livestock trailers.

PARKING: To better accommodate our livestock exhibitors, parking inside the fenced area will be limited to only vehicles carrying livestock. Please contact Lew Clark, Superintendent, to obtain a parking permit for your livestock vehicle. This permit will admit the vehicle and driver **ONLY**.

WHO MAY ENTER: Open show, no exhibitor tickets required. Owner and two helpers will be admitted with their animals.

ENTRY BLANKS: A blank must be completed by each exhibitor. Post entries will be accepted by the superintendent, or they may be mailed in advance to Bethlehem Fair, PO Box 488, Bethlehem, CT 06751.

DELIVER EXHIBIT: Animals must be on the grounds and ready to show by 9 am Saturday and remain until 5 pm. **The scale will close at 9 am.** They must enter the South Gate to obtain access to the area East of the show ring. **The South gate will close at 9 am and not reopen for re-entry until 8 pm.**

DEPARTMENT RULES

NOTE: RANDOM TESTING MAY BE PERFORMED.

- CONNECTICUT REQUIREMENTS: All exhibitors are required to show to the Secretary a RABIES VACCINATION CERTIFICATE SIGNED BY AN ACCREDITED VETERINARIAN indicating the name of the vaccine and serial number. Animals must be vaccinated 30 days prior to the first show date. NO EXCEPTIONS. Exhibitor will be required to display to the Secretary the health certificates as required by the Connecticut Department of Agriculture. NO ANIMALS ARE TO BE UNLOADED UNTIL THE SECRETARY HAS SEEN THESE DOCUMENTS. Animals' ear tags must match certificates.
- This department will be conducted and judged under revised rules of the Connecticut Ox Owners and Drivers Association. Copies of these rules may be obtained from the superintendent or from the show secretary. NO PLASTIC OR FIBERGLASS GOAD STICKS PERMITTED.
- 3. Prize may be withheld in any instance where, in the opinion of the judges, the animal is found to be unworthy.
- Owners of draught cattle must present animals at the scales for weighing at the request of the superintendent.
- Exhibitors from out of state must comply with regulations of the Connecticut
 Department of Agriculture by presenting health certificates issued within 30 days
 of the Fair date to the superintendent.
- 6. I understand that the Bethlehem Fair Society and Committee will not be responsible for injury to livestock.
- The committee reserves the right to decline acceptance of the entry of any team or owner when, in the opinion of the committee, it would not be in the best interest of the Bethlehem Fair to do so.



- Health checks will be done as animals are unloaded. Rabies vaccines are strongly recommended.





Excellent – Free from injury (not over 25% waste and not more than slightly affecting appearance); uniform in size, shape, and color (not over 10% variance); of the best market size and quality (beets $1 \frac{1}{2}$ "-3", carrots $\frac{1}{2}$ "-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", onions over 2", potatoes 6-12 oz.). True to variety type.

Good – Clean; free from damage (not over 25% waste and not damaging appearance); fairly uniform in size, shape, and color (not over 25% variance); of good market size and quality (beets over $1\,\%$ ", carrots 1-2 %", potatoes 5-12 oz.). Fairly true to variety type.

Worthy – Fairly clean; free from serious damage (not over 10% waste and not seriously damaging appearance); fairly uniform in size, shape, and color (less than 100% variance); of fair market size and quality (beets 1"-4", carrots 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ "-3", onions over 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", potatoes 4-14 oz.). Not off-type enough to be disqualified.

Unworthy – Dirty; seriously damaged by disease, insects, or other means; extreme difference in size, shape, and color; plate is unworthy if largest specimen is twice the size of the smallest. One or a combination of the above points will disqualify an exhibit.

*JUDGING STANDARDS FOR HEAVIEST PUMPKINS

- All giant pumpkins and squash are eligible for competition and will be weighed in separate categories
- Squash will be classified as any fruit with a surface area that is at least 75% green, blue, or gray in color. The portion of the fruit in contact with the ground will not be considered in the color classification.
- 3. Pumpkins will be all fruit not classified as squash.
- An exhibitor may enter one (1) specimen per class and must be present when the pumpkin or squash is weighed. The entry must be grown, cared for, and exhibited by the grower.
- The specimen must be present for the entire duration of the fair to be eligible for prizes.



- 1/2 cup dried cranberries

Directions

- Preheat oven to 350°. In a large bowl, beat the first 5 ingredients until well blended. In another bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, and salt. Add to egg mixture; mix just until moistened (dough will be sticky). Stir in pumpkin seeds and cranberries.
- 2. Divide dough in half. On a baking sheet coated with cooking spray, shape each portion into a 12x2-in. rectangle using lightly floured hands. Bake until golden brown, 25-30 minutes.
- 3. Carefully remove rectangles to wire racks; cool 10 minutes. Transfer to a cutting board. Using a serrated knife, cut diagonally into 3/4-in. slices. Return to baking sheets, cut side down.
- 4. Bake until firm, about 5 minutes. Turn; bake until lightly browned, 5-10 minutes. Remove from pans to wire racks to cool. Store in an airtight container.
- 5. Submit 6 biscotti on a disposable plate inside a Ziploc-style bag with tags attached to plate.

Association of Connecticut Fairs Baking Contests

Each year The Association of Connecticut Fairs sponsors baking contests open to the public at participating member fairs. There are separate contests for Junior and Adult divisions, each with a specific recipe. A Two-Crusted Apple Pie Baking contest is also held.

WHO MAY ENTER: The contests at each participating member fair are open to all adults and juniors. Commercial, industrial, or professional bakers are not eligible. Divisions: Juniors (ages 7 to 15 as of July 1st) and Adult.

HOW TO ENTER: Anyone entering a contest at any participating member fair is automatically entered and competing in the local contest. Contestants may enter the contest at as many fairs as they wish until they win first prize. They will then represent that fair at the state baking contest. Please submit entries to both the local and state contest on disposable plates. The Association of Connecticut Fairs and the member fairs are not responsible for the return of plates, trays or containers.

JUDGING: The judging will be based upon appearance, flavor and texture. The Association of Connecticut Fairs will furnish judges' score sheets to each fair and the contestant will receive these sheets at the end of the contest. Additions, deletions or substitutions in the recipe are not permitted and will result in disgualification. All decisions of the judges are final.

LOCAL CONTEST: The winner of the local contest will receive a blue ribbon from the Association of Connecticut Fairs and will then become eligible to submit their entry at the state contest. In the event that only one entry is received at the local contest and that entry is worthy of first prize, that entry must be awarded the first place ribbon.

STATE CONTEST: The state contest is held as part of the Fall Meeting and Convention of the Association of Connecticut Fairs. Entries for the state contests are accepted from 8:00 am to 10:00 am on the day of the judging (contact your local fair or visit www.ctagfairs.org for the date and location). Contest winners are announced at the Fall Meeting. Each fair is responsible for contacting their contest winner and providing them with information. The Association of Connecticut Fairs does not contact individual fairs or contest winners in regards to the contest and banquet reservations nor does the Association of Connecticut Fairs cover the costs of attending the awards banquet. No banquet reservations for contest winners will be accepted at the door.

Adult Baking Contest – 2024

Zebra Cake with Cream Cheese Frosting

Ingredients:

Cake:

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

4 large eggs

1 cup milk

3/4 cup vegetable oil

1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract

1/4 teaspoon almond extract

2 cups King Arthur Baking Unbleached All-Purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

3/4 teaspoon table salt

3 tablespoons Dutch-process cocoa

3/4 teaspoon espresso powder

Cream Cheese Frosting:

8 ounces cream cheese (brick-style), at room temperature

8 tablespoons unsalted butter (1 stick), at room temperature

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 cups confectioner's sugar, sifted

Instructions:

Cake:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F. Lightly spray a 9" x 2" round baking pan with cooking spray. Line the bottom of the pan with a circle of parchment and spritz again. Set the pan aside.
- 2. In a bowl beat the sugar and eggs until lightened, about 2 minutes. On low speed, beat in the oil, milk, vanilla extract, and almond extract until smooth.
- 3. In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, and salt. Whisk to remove any lumps. Add the dry mixture to the wet ingredients. Combine on medium-speed 1-2 minutes or until the batter is smooth and lump-free. Be sure to scrape down the bowl halfway through mixing.
- 4. Remove 2 cups of the vanilla batter and place it in a separate bowl. Sift the cocoa and espresso powder over the remaining batter in the bowl and stir well to combine. Be sure to use a sifter to avoid cocoa lumps in the batter.
- 5. Spoon 3 tablespoons of vanilla batter into the center of the cake pan. Next, spoon 3 tablespoons of the chocolate batter into the center of the vanilla batter. This causes the vanilla batter to spread out. Continue to alternate batters, in bulls-eye fashion until all batter is used. You will now have thin rings of each batter on the outer edges of the pan, thicker rings towards the center.

6. Bake the cake in the center of the preheated oven for 40 to 45 minutes, or until the cake is lightly browned and a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean. Cool the cake in the pan for 10 minutes, and then, turn out onto a wire rack to finish cooling.

Cream Cheese Frosting:

- In a bowl, beat the cream cheese, butter, and vanilla on medium-high speed until very light, creamy, and smooth. On low speed, gradually add in the confectioner's sugar and beat until fluffy.
- 2. Frost top and side of cake.

Submit on foil-covered cardboard measured no more than one inch from side of cake.

Back-of-the-Bag Oatmeal Bread

Ingredients:

Dough

- 3 cups (360g) King Arthur Unbleached Bread Flour
- 1 cup (89g) old-fashioned rolled oats
- 2 tablespoons (28g) butter
- 1 1/2 teaspoons (9g) table salt
- 3 tablespoons (40g) light brown sugar, dark brown sugar, or 3 tablespoons (63g) honey
- 2 teaspoons instant yeast
- 1 1/4 cups (283g) lukewarm milk

Topping

- 1 large egg white
- 1 tablespoon (14g) water, cold
- 1 to 2 tablespoons (6g to 12g) old-fashioned rolled oats

Instructions:

- Weigh your flour, or measure it by gently spooning it into a cup, then sweeping off any excess.
- 2. **To make the dough:** In a large mixing bowl, or in the bowl of a stand mixer, mix together all of the ingredients to form a rough, shaggy dough.
- 3. Knead the dough, by hand or mixer, until it's springy though still somewhat soft, about 5 to 7 minutes. The dough may feel quite sticky at the beginning; don't be tempted to add more flour, as additional flour will make the loaf dry. If you're kneading by hand, try kneading on a lightly greased work surface rather than a floured surface.
- 4. Place the dough in a lightly greased bowl, cover, and allow it to rise at room temperature for 1 hour; it'll become quite puffy, though it may not double in bulk. If your kitchen is particularly cold (below 65°F), place the bowl of dough in your turned-off oven with the oven light on.

- 5. **To shape the dough:** Transfer the dough to a lightly oiled surface. Flatten the dough into a 6" x 8" rectangle. Fold the top down to the center (like you were folding a letter), pressing it firmly with the heel of your hand to seal. Pull the upper left and right corners into the center, pressing to seal. Repeat the first step (folding the top to the center and sealing) three or four more times, until you've created a 9" to 10" log. Tuck the ends under slightly, and turn the log over so its seam is on the bottom.
- 6. Place the log in a lightly greased 9" x 5" loaf pan, and tent the pan with lightly greased plastic wrap or the cover of your choice. Allow the dough to rise for 1 to 1 1/2 hours, until it's crested about 1" over the rim of the pan.
- 7. Towards the end of the rising time, preheat your oven to 350°F with a rack in the center.
- 8. **To add the topping:** Uncover the risen loaf. Beat the egg white with the cold water. Brush the beaten white all over the top crust (you won't need it all), then sprinkle with the rolled oats.
- 9. **To bake the bread:** Bake the bread for 35 to 40 minutes, until it's golden brown. If the bread appears to be browning too quickly, cover it lightly with aluminum foil for the final 10 minutes of baking. When done, a <u>digital thermometer</u> inserted into the center of the loaf will register 190°F. If you don't have a thermometer, slide the bread out of its pan and tap its bottom with your fingers: you should hear a hollow thump.
- 10. Remove the bread from the oven and turn it out of the pan onto a rack to cool.
- 11. Submit bread on a disposable plate inside a Ziploc-type bag, with tags attached to the plate.

- 4. No jerking the stone boat. You must tighten the chain before pulling.

Stock Garden Tractor Pull, continued

- Pullers must remain seated in the seat. Pullers must keep one hand on the steering wheel at all times while pulling. No leaning back further than the back edge of the seat.
- 6. For adults, only one person per tractor per class will be allowed. Two children from an immediate family, per tractor, may pull in the same class, only if one tractor is used.
- 7. Kids age 6-14 must be able to safely operate the tractor to the satisfaction of our officials. Kids must also have an adult coach at all times. Coaches must remain outside the boundary lines at the time of the pull.
- 8. Officials will "class" and check all tractors. Officials' judgments are final.
- 9. No horseplay or alcoholic beverages allowed.
- 10. No passengers allowed on the tractor.
- 11. No cheating. First offense: Puller will receive a warning. Second offence: Puller will be disqualified for two pulls. Third offence: Children will be disqualified for the season; adults will be disqualified permanently.
- 12. All tractors must have a clevis or a hole in the drawbar large enough to accept the hook from the stone boat. The hole must be at least 2" in diameter. The hitch shall be located 1" below the center line of the rear axle.
- 13. Class winners will be allowed to move up to the next class pull; they will compete for fun only, not for ribbons.
- 14. The pulling committee and officials reserve the right to add any additional rules and correct any problems that occur at a pull.
- 15. After pulling, pullers must take tractors directly to the truck or trailer it will be loaded on; no driving around the fairgrounds. No speeding on the fairgrounds or in parking areas.
- 16. Only gas pump fuel permitted; no alcohol, aviation, or racing fuel allowed.

STOCK GARDEN TRACTORS

- 1. Stock Garden Tractors shall be up to 20 hp, one or two cylinders, with gasoline engines. Engines cannot run over 3,600 rpm.
- 2. All tractors must maintain original engine hp and number of cylinders. Any tractor not meeting engine requirements shall pull in Super Stock.
- All tractors must have a rigid drawbar height for big wheels; Classes 7 and 8 will be 12" from the ground. Economy tractors will have a stock hitch that was original equipment or one rebuilt to original specs. No bolt-on drawbars behind the rear axle.
- 4. No locked rear ends permitted; those equipped cannot use them.
- 5. Wheel Weights for Classes 1 through 8:
 - 8" to 12" Can be homemade; not to exceed 75 lbs per wheel
 - Big Wheels Manufactured only; not to exceed 140 lbs per wheel.
 - Weights may be weighed any time at the discretion of pull officials; they must be removable.
- 6. Under-mounted mowers are allowed. No chains over 10" long to hold the mower deck of the tractor. No other attachments.
- 7. No cut tires, tire chains, dual wheels, 4x4s, crawlers, steel wheels, Pit Bulls, Cepeks, or professional pulling tires.
- 8. Wheelie bars must be strong enough to support the tractor. Bars must be made of 2" sq. tubing, 1 thick, or flat stock, 1 x 2 max. brace, 1 x 1 x x angle. Cross brace must not interfere with the hitch or chain. Bars must

- not extend more than 4" behind the exterior of the tire or more than 6" from the ground. They must have wheels or pads.
- Cub Cadets must have a shield to deflect any flying parts to the ground in the event of a mishap. The shield must be made of 16 gauge steel or %" aluminum and must surround the clutch housing on the top and both sides.
- 10. Gravely tractors must have a flywheel shield of extruded/expanded steel or ½" thick plate no larger than 12" x 12". It will be installed to block the rear flywheel from hands.
- 11. Stock seats only. No car seats, truck seats, bucket seats, or other.
- 12. Pullers must remain seated in the seat. No bouncing. One hand must remain on the wheel at all times.
- 13. Flagrant violators of any rule(s) may be prohibited from pulling at the discretion of the officials.

SUPER STOCK TRACTORS - CLASS 9

- 1. Garden Tractors shall be up to 20 hp, one or two cylinders, 4 cycle, with gasoline engines. Engines must come from a Garden Tractor.
- 2. Engines must be stock, not modified.
- 3. Tractors must maintain the look/sheet metal of a stock garden tractor.
- 4. Frame cannot be lengthened more than 4". Hood cannot be raised more than 3". Tractors must have wheelie bars that are strong enough to support the tractor. Wheelie bars must not extend more than 4" behind the exterior of the tire and no more than 6" from the ground. See Stock Garden Tractor rules for requirements.
- 5. All tractors must have a rigid drawbar. Maximum drawbar height will be 14". Drawbars may not extend rearward more than 15" from the center of the axle. Rear-engine tractors are the exception, with rigid drawbars being as close to the engine as possible.
- 6. Maximum engine rpm must not exceed 4000 rpm and may be checked at any time. All tractors must have sufficient shielding of belts, chains, clutches, etc. to deflect any flying parts to the ground.
- 7. Any type of tire may be used. Tires can be modified. Maximum tire size will be 31/15.5/15. No dual wheels, tire chains, or studs.
- 8. Super Stock Tractors cannot pull in any other class. Tractors may not weight more than 1700 lbs with 31/15.5/15 tires, or 1800 lbs with 26/12.5x12 tires. Weight may be added to achieve these weights.
- 9. All tractor weights must be secured to the chassis so they cannot fall off. If any weights that fall off, the pull will be disqualified.
- 10. Any tractor not fully passing safety inspection will not be permitted to pull.
- 11. Pullers are asked to provide pictures of tractor on the scale with ticket.
- 12. Super Stock Tractors will be weighed. There will be a one-time fee for the scale, to be paid by the puller. Tractors may be rechecked at any time at a later pull, for no fee, and at the discretion of the pull officials.

Classes will not be pulled in number order in all fairness, so no class pulls first or last all season. Pulling order will be decided on day of event.




